

Macquarie Dohne stud sale report 2008 Brad Wilson

Macquarie Dohne stud, Warren, sold rams to \$2600 twice, to average \$1402, in the sixty seven per cent clearance of 150 rams, the largest line up of Dohne rams in Eastern Australia, last week (Monday October 13).

Continued support from established clients saw rams travel to Walgett, Yeoval, Collarenebri, Gulargambone, Dubbo, Garah and to the Queensland pastoral areas of Cunnamulla and Bollon. Greg McCann Co Principal, Macquarie Dohne stud said "the aim of the stud is to breed high reproductive, performing sheep, with rapid growth rates, while maintaining the wool quality of the 19 – 20 micron clip".

Chris Carrigan, "Welbon", Garah, purchased four rams, including one of the \$2600 sale top price, AA, 133.9 indexing ram rams, to average \$1900.

"Mr Carrigan, who has purchased at the sale since it commenced five years ago, said "he was breeding towards a pure Dohne flock".

"The quality ram has good wool and figures, on a big frame, and the Macquarie Dohne stud provides a good client relationship", Mr Carrigan said.

Mark and Sam Evans, "Martindale", Walgett, took home seven rams, paying to \$2600 the equal top priced ram, to average \$1743.

Sam Evans described the ram as displaying "good length, size and muscle pattern, accompanied by good figures and wool quality".

Volume buyers included Dennis O'Brien, "Cryon Station", Walgett, who averaged \$1666 for his draft of fifteen rams, five more than last year, while Dave Hawker, Westlea Pastoral Company, Cunnamulla Queensland, took home ten rams, to average \$1400.

Mr Hawker, who is breeding towards a pure Dohne flock, has just recently purchased Calga Dohne Studs, F1 flock ewes, said "he was happy with the selection of rams, the size, structure and body weight on offer".

Micheal O'Brien, Brigalows Pastoral Company, Walgett, purchased six rams, paying to \$2400, to average \$2233, while the Winning family, Bollon, QLD took nine rams across the border, averaging \$1444.

The sale was conducted by Elders and Landmark, with Paul Dooley and John Setttee as the auctioneers.

Dubbo Dohne National Sale & Expo 2008 Mark Griggs

The Dohne momentum continues with breeders from the five mainland states pushing up ram values another \$512 a head on average at Dubbo last week.

Of the 40 rams offered by 10 studs at the Eighth Annual National Dohne Ram Sale at Dubbo showground on Friday, August 15, 38 sold to \$12,200, grossed \$96,050 and averaged \$2528, effecting a 95 per cent auction clearance.

The result compares most favourably to last year when 37 rams topped at \$10,250, grossed \$74,600 to average \$2016.

This year's gross increased on last year by \$21,450 while the average jumped by \$512 and is \$844 a head better than the 2006 average.

An innovative introduction to the sale this year was the offering of specially selected rams following the special stud catalogue.

The special stud ram section resulted in 27 of the 29 head selling to gross \$78,750 and average \$2917, while the 11 specially selected all sold to a top of \$2000 (twice), grossed \$17,300 to average \$1573.

The sale was the culmination of the two-day ANZ National Dohne Expo which also featured the Fletcher International Dohne Carcase Competition and the Chad Wool Dohne Fleece Competition.

Chairman of the Eastern States committee of the Australian Dohne Breeders Association, John Nadin said the result reflected the confidence continually building in the Dohne breed, especially towards its lamb and wool production qualities.

“The mulesing issue is another aspect,” Mr Nadin said, “most enquiries we field now are concerning the bare breach attributes of Dohnes.”

Liking the body shape and wool type of Lot One, Craig Robertson of Havelock Park Dohnes, Fernbank, near Stratford, Victoria, fought off a bidding duel to win the Macquarie Dohne stud ram for the top price of \$12,200.

MD064492 is an ET son of the \$20,000 sire MD030681 of the Olympus family, which sold to Bill Pye’s Calga Dohnes enterprise at Coonamble at this fixture in 2004, and was described by Macquarie Dohne stud co-principal, Greg McCann as structurally, an extremely correct ram.

“His sire left extremely consistent stock in the years that we’ve used him,” Mr McCann said.

“We have used 4492 in our stud and have retained semen,” he said.

“However his progeny are too young at this stage to be assessed, but we believe they will continue the top breeding cycle.”

Mr Robertson said he liked the carcass shape and wool qualities of the ram, plus his family and performance background.

“He has a great carcass shape and produces bright fine/medium wool,” Mr Robertson said.

The ram will be joined to selected stud ewes in November, selected from the 500 stud ewe flock.

The Havelock Park flock also runs 2200 F1 and F2 ewes.

Second top money at \$12,000 was paid by a syndicate of studs, one from South Australia and two from Western Australia, for a lone entry from Justin and Nicole Tombs’ Harewood stud, Armidale.

Each stud has already used the ram through AI and have progeny on the ground, so decided to secure him for their individual marketing programs.

Syndicate members from Western Australia are Far Valley Dohnes, Arthur River, Wagin and Chirninup Dohnes of Nyabing, with Babirra Dohnes of Stansbury, South Australia.

Speaking on behalf of the buyers, Robert Farrow of Babirra stud said the ram, HW060368, belongs to a family that has the ability to breed true to type.

“He has excellent carcass qualities, is smooth right through the loin to the rump, just where meat returns come from,” Mr Farrow said.

“Above all, he has soft stylish wool that would grow in all types of country.”

Macquarie Dohne stud also gained \$6000 for a ram from the same Olympus family, being a grandson of “681”, sire of the top-priced ram.

He was purchased by Jamie Pilon for his Narriah Dohne enterprise on “Mountain View”, Tallimba.

Macquarie Dohne sale report – 8/10/2007

Macquarie Dohne rams averaged \$1600, up \$112 on last years sale average, Dohne rams went to Victoria, Queensland and to local clients for Vendors John Nadin and Greg McCann, Mumblebone West, Warren last week.

Macquarie Dohne stud sold 111 of the 117 rams offered, selling to \$2800, equaling last years top sale price.

Co principal John Nadin said “He was surprised by the strength of the sale considering the continuing dry, the strength of the sale gives the Dohne breed the creditability it deserves”.

A lot of our clients are fifth and sixth generation sheep producers, what it comes down to is the return per hectare and the Dohne is rite up their, Mr Nadin said.

Mr Nadin said “Macquarie Dohne clients have average \$100 for the complete drop of wether lambs and some clients Dohne wool has consistently out sold and tested finer then their merino clip”.

Dennis O’Brien “Cryon Station” Walgett, purchased the top price AA ram, for \$2800, the ram displayed a 113.3 index and was sired by 2006 National Dohne Sale top priced ram MD 041792, who sold for \$8000.

Mr O’Brien purchased 10 rams, paying \$2800 for the sale top price and \$2000 three times in his draft of ten rams, which averaged \$1888.

Last year the O’Brien family purchased 16 rams with an average of \$1875.

“I was first attracted to Macquarie Dohne rams at the National Dohne sale four years ago, John and Greg run a good operation, there is a real science behind the breeding of their sheep”, Mr O’Brien said.

Properties in the Walgett district will be home for a large number of Macquarie rams including Mr O'Brien's purchasers.

Sam Evans "Martindale" Walgett paid to \$2000 for his draft of ten rams to average \$1740, while the Currey family "Aberfoyle", Walgett averaged \$1657, for seven rams.

The Evans family join 5500 Dohne; F2 and F1 ewes on their property, aiming to turn lambs off over the hook in December.

I like the quality of wool and the dual purpose markets that Dohne sheep offer, Mr Evans Said.

Bill Yates, "Amondale", Garah, averaged \$1400 for 11 rams, while the Winning family "Mona Station", Bollon, averaged \$1644 for nine rams.

Gulargambone clients, Steve and Tracey Rae, "Emby", paid to \$1800 for eight rams, with an average of \$1475.

Local client O'Brien Brigalows Pastoral Company, Carinda, bought five rams, paying to \$2200 for an AA, 115.8 index ram, while averaging \$1800.

Chris Carrigan, Welbon Grazing Company, Garah, purchased six rams, grossing \$9800, to average \$1633.

The sale was conducted by Elders in conjunction with landmark, with Paul Dooley and Andrew Wishart as the auctioneers.

National Dohne Ram sale – Dubbo 17/08/2007

Topping off two days of intense breed promotion, 37 Dohne stud rams topped at \$10,250 and averaged \$2016 at Dubbo last week.

The 7th annual National Dohne Ram Sale, which grossed \$74,600 for an 84 per cent auction clearance of the 44 head offering, was the topping on the promotional cake for the Dohne breed's inaugural ANZ Dohne Expo at Dubbo showground, attracting many hundreds of sheep breeders, whether meat or wool orientated.

Buyers came from four States and bid with spirit for the offering of top quality sires from 12 NSW studs.

Last year 48 rams sold to \$8000 and averaged \$1684.

Dohne breeders for the past six years, Judy and Stan Ellis of West Wail Dohnes, Pimpinio via Horsham, Victoria paid the \$10,250 top money for a 122.4 index embryo transfer son of the South African bred Wynand du Tort sire JG020106 from a Lowlands Estate dam, offered by the DD Dohne stud, Moama.

DD Dohne stud manager, Bruce Barnes-Webb said the Wynand du Tort stud is based in the winter rainfall Bredarsdorp district near Capetown while Lowlands Estate is conducted by Hugh Collett at Cradock, on the Fish River Irrigation Scheme in the summer rainfall region.

DD Dohne's six rams sold to gross \$15,250 and average \$2542.

Mr Barnes-Webb said DD Dohnes is owned by a consortium of Australian and South African interests who will continue to bring into Australia, genetics from selected South African studs on an annual basis.

"This we be facilitated by our embryo station on the Moama property," he said.

"We want to be the source of out-crosses and are blending South African genetics that we think will stand up to the weather conditions in Australia.

DD stud was established in 2004 and now runs 300 stud ewes on ground.

Mr and Mrs Ellis started an AI program with 400 Merino ewes as a base, six years ago.

Today they run 50 purebred, 100 F3, 400 F2 and 110 F1 ewes.

"The price is double what we wanted to pay, but if you want the wool, you've got to pay for it," Mr Ellis said of their purchase.

They earlier paid \$3000 for a 126.3 index ram from Donald Mills' Kardinia stud, Corowa.

Second top money at \$5750 was paid by two Victorian studs for the top of Uardry Dohne stud's draft of five rams which averaged \$2900.

The Langlea stud of Edenhope and Sutton Grange stud of Nhill bought an 118.8 index son of UD040377, one of three rams by this sire selling on the day.

Uardry also gained \$4000 for another ram when purchased by the Leach family's Glenlea Dohne Stud, Kataning, Western Australia.

Coonamble based Martin Kahler of Calga Dohnes, paid \$5000 third top price for the Macquarie Dohnes draft topper, an 120.4 index son of MD030912.

Macquarie stud sold five rams to average \$2750.

The Arnold family of "Currawalla", Coonamble spent \$6500 on four rams, one each from Alfoxton, Macquarie, Hyland and Roseville Park studs.

Five rams at \$1000 each were purchased by Coonong stud, Urana, all from DD Dohnes.

The sale was conducted by Landmark (Warwick Barrett auctioneer) and Elders (Paul Jameson auctioneer).

ALL THE rams were snapped up at the first Adelaide Dohne Merino Ram Sale on October 3 – a combined sale by Mount Alma and Babirra studs.

Principals Ivan Ashby and Robert Farrow said the hardy Dohnes had a good future, and the sale interest echoed this, with seven Dohne stud breeders from South Australia, Victoria and New South Wales buying rams.

Mt Alma, which is in partnership with Suidplaas in South Africa, recorded a top of \$5400, paid by John Nadin, MacQuarie Stud, Warren, New South Wales.

The ram had a comfort factor of 99.7 per cent, 20 microns, and CV 14.

The stud, based at Inman Valley and Coonalpyn, had an average of \$2603, with several rams going for more than \$3000.

Babirra, Stansbury, recorded a slightly lower top price and average.

Keith and Judy Peach, Lucernbrae Merino Stud, Callington, bought the top-price ram for \$3400.

Mr Ashby hopes to have more than 100 rams for sale next year.

Other buyers were Para Ranges Estates, Cavan, three each at \$2400; DW Taylor, Mount Pleasant, three

to \$2500 (av \$2100); Petaren Farm, Coonalpyn, three to \$2400 (av \$2200); RJ Elvey, Karoonda, four to \$2400.

All of the 28 paddock-reared rams sold by the Ashby family will take a lifetime reproductive rate of 170 per cent to their new homes.

With 27 buyers for 45 rams, it was difficult to find a volume buyer. However, RJ Elvey, Sherlock, was successful in taking home four rams to a top of \$3000 (av \$2350).

Dohne National averages \$1684 – 9/10/06

The 6th National Dohne sale at Dubbo saw a clearance of only 48 from the 97 rams offered and sold to a top of \$8000 to average \$1684.

The sale was affected by the worsening drought conditions which precluded many breeders from buying, rather they were looking at surviving the coming summer conditions with a lack of feed and ground water.

However, the buyers who did secure rams, both stud and flock buyers were complimentary of the rams on offer, particularly their performance figures and wool quality.

The wool quality was an important point for many sheepmen as the Dohne would give them a quality fleece along with a great carcass.

Top price of \$8000 was paid by Bill Mildren, Elders Breeding Services, Albury on behalf of the Mitchell family, "Murragamba", Goonure via Bairnsdale, Vic., for a Macquarie stud ram with an index of 125.6 and eye muscle depth (EMD) of 0.65

A share in the ram was also purchased by Don Mills, Kardinia Dohne stud, Corowa.

Mr Mildren had earlier purchased son F1 and F2 Dohne ewes from Uardry stud, hay at \$70.00/head and described the ewes and ram as having the scale and meat volume combined with very attractive wool.

West Australian Dohne stud breeder, Alex Leach, Glenlea stud, Katanning paid the second top price of \$6500 for a stud ram from the Uardry stud. The ram, only 15 months old had an index of 122.3.

Mr Leach said the ram had a great overall balance, walked out very well and was structurally correct with great bone and frame and was in short " a very good Dohne" who will complement his stud which comprises more than 400 ewes which supplies rams for use in his 6000 flock ewes.

Mr Leach also outlaid \$3200 for a stud ram from the DD Dohne stud of Bruce Barnes-Webb, Moama.

This ram was the result of an ET program in South Africa, he had an index of 122.0, the bloodlines and overall quality of the ram appealed to Mr Leach.

Derek Lotz and family, "Caringal", Narrandera paid \$3000 for a ram from the Gullendah stud of Peter and Margot Hughes, Baldry.

Other interstate support came from Queensland and South Australia.

Volume buyer was Gladys Downs Grazing Co., Augathella, Qld., with the purchase of eight rams at an average of \$1050 with a top price of \$1200.

The Winning family, "Mona Station", Bollon, Qld., took home six rams to a top of \$1600, three times to average \$1200.

Peter and Tim Hall, Jamestown, SA secured six rams at an average of \$2017 after paying to a top of \$2300 for a ram from the DD stud.

Ian Osborn, "Euralah", Walgett purchased five rams at an average of \$1310 after paying to a top of \$1600 for a ram from the Macquarie stud.

Selling agents were Elders and Landmark with auctioneers Paul Dooley and Andrew Wishart.

Demand for Dohne flock rams remains buoyant – 25/10/06

Dual purpose meat and wool breed Dohne rams sold to a top of \$1400 and averaged \$981 with a 92% clearance at the inaugural Eastern Breeders Dohne ram sale held at Naracoorte Showgrounds on the 25th October.

Participating studs were Macquarie, Uardry and Kardinia.

Spokesman for the group John Nadin, Macquarie, was delighted with the sale considering the extremely dry conditions in the South East. 'The idea of holding the sale in the South East was to service an existing clientele along with the enquiry we have all had from the area. We decided to go ahead with the sale regardless of the seasonal conditions. The Dohne has a lot to offer sheep producers having been performance bred since the 1970's focusing on 70% meat and 30% wool production. The Dohne offers traditional woolgrowers the opportunity to diversify into a meat-producing sheep breed without having to compromise the wool quality of their flock. The Dohne is a self-replacing, highly fertile meat merino producing early maturing lambs with a carcass equal to traditional crossbreds and carrying a quality 19-21 micron merino fleece. We look forward to holding another sale in October 2007'.

Top sale price of \$1400 was paid by Paul Schultz, Warialda Trust Sandilands via Ardrossan for a Macquarie ram with an index of 114.2, an EBV for body weight of +12.51 and an EBV for eye muscle of +1.32. The Schulz family finished with 3 Macquarie rams for an \$1800 average.

Uardry's top price of \$1200 was paid by AD & EH Gordon for a ram with an index of 115.9, an EBV for body weight of +6.48 and an EBV for eye muscle of +0.67.

Kardinia's top price of \$1200 was paid by Corovale Partnership for a ram with an index of 111.4 and an EBV for body weight of +2.91.

Volume buyer was Grantley Filmer Heathwell Holdings Tintinara buying 7 rams for a \$900 average.

In the break up Macquarie sold 19 from 22 for a \$1005 average, Uardry sold 19 from 20 for a \$957 average and Kardinia sold 6 from 6 for a \$983 average.

The sale comes off the back of strong on-property sales the previous week with Macquarie selling 113 rams to a top of \$2800 averaging \$1488 with a 93% clearance and Uardry selling 95 rams to a top of \$5000 averaging \$1206 with a 95% clearance.

The sale was conducted by Elders and Landmark. Auctioneers were Leigh Allen and Malcolm Scroop.

The multi-vendor sale averaged \$1348 in a 66 per cent auction clearance.

Rams with good figures made the best prices under auctioneer Kevin Norris, Landmark Albury.

The Uardry stud, Hay sold the top money ram with an index of 118.5 to Vicki and Brian Hewitt, Pineside Dohne stud, Aria Park.

Volume buyer, "West Plains" Forbes bought three rams from Uardry to a top of \$1400.

Larundel Limited, "Larundel" Walla Walla, paid \$1600 for another Uardry ram, and Peter Tischler, Edenhope, Victoria, paid \$1000 each for his Uardry picks.

Don Mills, Kardinia Dohne Stud, Corowa, sold rams to a top of \$2200.

The \$2200 ram was bought by Cressy Park Pastoral Company, Mangoplah.

John Nadin and Greg McCann, Macquarie Dohne Stud, Warren, sold a ram with an index of 112.7 to Tom Low, "Back Creek", Wyalong, for \$1600.

The same buyer secured a second ram from Macquarie Dohne Stud for \$1400.

Dohne rams sold to \$2800 and 113 averaged \$1488 in a 93% clearance in the strongest sale in eastern Australia this season for Greg McCann's and John Nadin's Macquarie Dohnes at "Mumblebone West", Warren.

Last year 133 rams sold to \$3800 and averaged \$2068.

John Nadin was delighted with the sale which with other strong spring sales at Uardry and Gullendah reflected the strong Dohne commercial base and the resulting strong demand and prices for flock rams.

Top sale price of \$2800 was paid by Michael O'Brien, "Brigalows", Carinda, for a 118.0 index AA ram by the \$20,000 sire Olympus MD 03-0681 which stood out for his conformation, figures and 16.89 body weight rating.

Michael O'Brien, who also bought other rams at \$2200 twice and \$2000 and averaged \$2067 for six rams, favours Dohne's on his pastoral country for their ability to produce more meat, more quickly.

"They are a true dual purpose meat and wool breed which produce the biggest possible lamb at the youngest age which can be sold as a store, feeder or prime lamb," he said.

"My spring 05 drop Dohne lambs averaged 28kg dead at 10 months, yielded 53% and sold for \$95 to Country Fresh," he said.

Michael O'Brien is grading up his commercial flock to purebred Dohnes.

Also on the same track are Dennis, Trish and Tim O'Brien, Cryon Station, Walgett, who bought 16 rams to \$2400 twice at an average of \$1875 including other lots for \$2200 and \$2000 six times.

Their \$2400 rams were a 120.7 index A grade and a 114.9 index A grade both by the \$9000 MD 03-0912.

Dennis O'Brien is delighted how his Dohnes have performed in the drought with F1 ewes producing 93.5% lambs and autumn drop five months-old F1 lambs spring sold for \$40 to a feedlot.

I.H. and D.J. Berrell, "Midgery", Walgett, paid \$2400 for a AA 119.8 index son of the \$12,000 IH 02-0409.

Taroona Pastoral Co., Wirrinya, paid \$2200 for a AA 110.8 index, M.D. and M.J. Winning, Bollon, Qld, \$2200 for AA 112.9 index and AA 118.0 index rams and Best Best Partnership, "Baroone", Gulargambone, \$2200 for A 110.1 index and A 113.6 index rams.

At a field day conducted by Chris and Beth Bowman, "Uardry", Hay, about 80 wool and prime lamb producers gathered to learn about the new option in the sheep industry.

Early sale figures of first cross (F1) Dohnes sold in Australia gave an indication of the worth and versatility of the sheep.

F1 Dohnes with a carcass weight of 25 kilograms returned a price per kilogram of three cents a kilogram with a fat score of three to four, to achieve a total carcass value of \$89.

The wool on these sheep was 19.7 micron and the seven-month wool cut was 3.2kg to return \$18.55, equating to total earnings of \$107.55 per head.

Another line of Australian F1 Dohnes with a carcass weight of 30 kilograms returned 350c/kg with a fat score of three, making a total value of \$106.50.

The sheep cut 5.4kg of 19.7-micron fleece at 12 months to make \$32, bringing the total sheep value to \$138.50.

The Bowmans were keen to expand their wool-sheep operation to encompass a meat-sheep option.

In 2000 they travelled to South Africa to view the Dohne Merinos, which boasted a 70 per cent meat emphasis backed up by 30pc wool.

They were impressed with the Dohne's ability to thrive in the pastoral areas and also cut good quality wool.

The Dohne weaner micron ranges from 18 to 21, and the adult micron is 21 to 23.

In South Africa the lambing percentage in studs is 140, with 104pc in commercial flocks.

Mr Bowman said the objective at "Uardry" was to provide clients with sheep breeding options to assist them to achieve a profitable bottom line.

"We have recognised the recent swing to producing a meat type of sheep to take advantage of the buoyant lamb market, but we also understand that many of our clients are wool producers at heart,"

he said.

While there are many alternative sheep breeds in Australia, Mr Bowman said he had set out to find a meat breed suited to pastoral areas with comparable growth rates and an ability to retain the most profitable wool cut.

NSW Agriculture livestock officer, Ashley White, Cowra, advised field day participants on preparing sheep cost-effectively for market.

He said there had been massive growth in export in recent years, with 35pc of all Australian lambs destined for overseas markets.

Mr White said it was important producers were aware of market specifications and turned sheep off at the correct weights and ages.

Rather than letting lambs' weight gains slip during difficult times, he advised that supplementary feeding was an option.

"There are a lot of grains that can be used: oats, barley and triticale, although triticale is probably not as good due to grain poisoning," he said.

He explained how a feed ration would cost out in a typical prime lamb operation.

If a total feed ration costs \$200 a tonne (20c/kg) and six kilograms of feed were needed to produce one kilogram of live weight, it would cost about \$2.40 to gain one kilogram of actual carcase weight.

The top price was for a Roseville Park ram offered by joint breeders, Graham and Sally Coddington, Dubbo, and Greg McCann, of Macquarie Artificial Breeding Services, Dubbo.

It was purchased by a syndicate of Charles Mills, Uardry Dohne stud, Hay, and three West Australian studs, which were also vendors at the sale. The WA parties in the purchase of the one-year-old ram

were Geoff and Helen Beeck, Summerfield stud, Katanning; Murray Drage, Amuri Creek stud, Tambellup, and David and Christine Kain, Far Valley stud, Wagin. The ram weighed 99 kilograms, had an eye muscle area (EMA) of 19.1 square centimetres and was covered with 18.4-micron wool with a co-efficient of variation (CV) of 14.7, a standard deviation (SD) of 2.7 and a comfort factor (CF) of 99.8 per cent. Mr Coddington said although preliminary interest had been high, the sale had exceeded his expectations. "I didn't think I was taking a risk when I saw how successful they were in South Africa," Mr Coddington said. He said the breed offered higher per head returns than either Merinos or meat sheep, fitting the management systems of traditional Merino producers as well as the existing lamb market. The sale attracted a huge amount of interest, with 61 registered bidders from five States among a crowd of more than 150 stud and commercial breeders. Apart from his stake in the top sire, the manager of Uardry Dohne stud, Hay, Chris Bowman, secured a further five rams at a \$6800 average for joining to 1500 Merino ewes. These included the \$10,000 second-top ram, which had the catalogue's highest Dohne Index figure, 116.8. The 92kg ram had the highest EMA at 21.21 sq. cm., and had an elite, deep-crimping, 19.7-micron fleece with a CV of 12.2, an SD of 2.4 and a CF of 100pc. Mr Bowman said the establishment in 1999 of Uardry Dohne stud, to run alongside the two Merino studs bearing the Uardry name, was a bid to offer clients maximum production options. "I think there will be good demand for purebred Dohnes, both in the Western Division and the Table lands, because they are a true-dual purpose sheep with medium-micron Merino wool," he said. A Trundle buyer, J. Dyrssen, "Mareetha", selected four rams at an average of \$3875. Commercial breeders, Bruce and Craig Ward, Mimosa Pastoral Company, Parkes, who already had five Dohne rams, averaged \$4312.50 for four rams at the national sale. The new purchases will be joined to half their 2000 Merino breeders. "We're shifting the emphasis from wool to meat," Bruce Ward said. The Wards aim to maintain a 21.5-micron average and have already tested the market, selling first-cross wether lambs to \$102.80 over-the-hooks. According to vendor, Ian Hanna, Koobelup Dohne Merino stud, Katanning, WA, this ready market acceptance is a major advantage.
